"LIVING TO SERVE" IS PART OF THE FFA MOTTO.

This year, \$7,500 in grant funding was awarded to six Montana FFA chapters seeking support for various service projects in their communities.

Keeping in the spirit of our motto, the Montana FFA Helping Hands Grant was created to secure funds for FFA community service projects. The Helping Hands Grant allows FFA members to apply for and receive the funding needed to move forward with their community service projects.

MILES CITY FFA received \$1,500 and is launching the "Keep Miles City Beautiful" Project, which addresses the need for sitting benches for walking trails within the Miles City community. Seventh and 8th-grade students enrolled in Agricultural Education classes at Washington Middle School will have the opportunity to work with the local Keeping Miles City Beautiful organization to develop bench type and needs for the existing community trail system. This interaction will allow for FFA members to work with the local organizations and further develop Miles City FFA's "living to serve" attitude.

VICTOR FFA earned \$1,500 and is committing to innovation through the Ravalli County Fairgrounds Improvement Project. The Victor community and Victor FFA regularly use the resources available through the county fairgrounds and are committed to giving back through repairing, replacing, and upgrading some facilities on the county fairgrounds.

PARK CITY FFA was awarded \$1,500 for their project, "Cleaning Park City's Park." Park City FFA identified that their town has one park that is hardly used. They want to provide the community a place to utilize and enjoy their long summer days. Cleaning up and revamping the park will allow this chapter to invest in local safety by giving a clean, welcoming environment for the community to gather. This project will also create space for Career and Technical Student Organizations (CTSO) in the area for meetings and fundraisers.

BIG TIMBER FFA is immersing in agriculture and lending a helping hand to one of their own. This chapter received \$1,250 for their project, "Rostad Lamb Shelters." Current Big Timber FFA member, Timothy Rostad suffered the unfortunate loss of his barn, 16 registered Columbia ewes, and 14 new lambs to fire the first week of March. Luckily, Tim's chapter has his back and has secured funding for rebuilding. The Big Timber FFA will build two 8' x 8' sheds to keep his current and future livestock out of the elements.

MISSION VALLEY FFA is using its \$1,000 grant to cultivate fresh produce for its local food pantry. The Bread Basket is the emergency food pantry in Ronan and currently serves over 500 people per month. Mission Valley FFA is planning on building garden beds and growing fresh vegetables to donate to Bread Basket.



MISSOULA FFA brought home \$750 for their "Beefing Up Our Community" project. Their chapter has identified that over 40% of students at Big Sky High School face food insecurity, and their project involves processing beef at their meat lab and donate it to local families in need.

Kristy Rothe, Missoula FFA Advisor, commented: "Throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, local families have faced a meat shortage while local ranchers have faced low sale prices and lack of processing availability.

AGRICULTURAL **OPPORTUNITIES** TOUR

ontana FFA members kicked off their summer n the best way possible, through agricultural opportunity discovery. June 10-13 marked the 12th annual Montana FFA Agricultural Opportunities Tour. This year, Ag Tour took place in Southwestern Montana, making stops in Helena, Dillon, Butte, and Deer Lodge. Twenty-one students and all eight State FFA Officers made the 382-mile journey.

The Ag Tour is a special project of the Montana FFA Foundation and is sponsored by Corteva Agriscience. It is designed to supply additional opportunities to FFA members to explore career opportunities in Montana related to agriculture, food, and natural resources. Members who participate in this event tour various agricultural production operations, discover the multifaceted agribusinesses that support our farmers and ranchers and interact with industry professionals. Students bring home these experiences to further develop their Supervised Agricultural Experiences, grow their vision of their future in agriculture, and share their knowledge as leaders in their schools and communities.

The first Ag Opportunities Tour was held in 2009. Every year, the tour has provided new learning experiences for FFA members in different regions of Montana. This year certainly brought its own flavor.

Starting in Helena, students first visited the Office of Public Instruction and spoke with Superintendent of Public Instruction, Elsie Arntzen. After learning how OPI supports career and technical education, the group traveled to the Montana Department of Agriculture. At the Department of Ag, students engaged in a better understanding of Montana ag trade and COVID-19's effect on agricultural commodities. At Montana Rail Link, members discovered the logistics required to transport our commodities to market. The blue jackets then headed south to visit Leep Dairy in Toston.

After the dairy, students kept moving south to Circle S Seeds in Three Forks. After touring the facilities and learning more about agronomy in southwestern Montana, the tour ventured further south to Alder for dinner at Boyd Angus Ranch. After dinner, sponsored by Madison Valley Bank, the crew visited Virginia City for a ghost town tour, and a deep dive into the history of natural resource management and agriculture during the peak of gold mining in Montana.

Day two brought innovation to the table, as the tour focused on production agriculture and how agriculturalists in southwestern Montana are practicing sustainable agriculture in their operations. This day kicked off with Garnet Mining Australia's U.S. mining operations in Alder. This open pit mine is the largest garnet mine in the United States and the second largest in the world. Yellowstone Farms in Dillon was the next destination. Yellowstone Farms is a small hemp production and distribution company. During the tour, students dove into learning what kinds added-value CBD products are made from hemp. When this tour was over, the bus traveled up the road to Sitz Angus Ranch where they enjoyed lunch sponsored by Opportunity Bank and a conversation about the importance of agricultural advocacy with Jim Sitz.

Another livestock operation the tour traveled to was Helle Ranch, owners Duckworth Wool Co. John Helle walked students through his wool production as well as some challenges he has faced within the ag industry pushing his operation into the public eye. Students learned about technology in animal production and non-traditional grazing methods at La Cense Livestock south of Dillon. The night was ended with a tour of University of Montana Western's campus and facilities with dinner sponsored by Frontline Ag Solutions.

The third day started bright and early with Cottom Seed Potatoes, where students toured the vast storage facilities and equipment used for seed potato production in Montana. The tour then leaped from potatoes to bees, as the group traveled to Butte and immersed themselves in a very important pollinator presentation with Bee Excellent.

From there, the tour traveled up the hill to the Montana Tech campus, where students enjoyed presentations of opportunities at Tech and a lunch sponsored by Kellan and Elizabeth Standley.

Hands-on learning was next on the docket at the Montana Sheet Metal Workers Apprenticeship Training Program. Not only did students learn about the metal fabrication industry and apprenticeship employment, but they also got their hands dirty with some metal work of their own! After building sheet metal boxes, students loaded the bus again and traveled to the Berkeley Pit where they dove (not literally) into the history of the richest hill on earth and its' role in natural resources waste management.

The hands-on learning continued as students launched into the second ever Agricultural Opportunities Tour Day of Service activity. This year, students helped clean up a local farm which included gardening, landscape management, and teamwork as the 21 students were put to work on the Lombardi Ranch. This year's Day of Service was sponsored by Northwestern Energy and Headwaters Resource Conservation Development with dinner sponsored by Peoples Bank of Deer Lodge.

Over twenty years ago, a group of agriculturists and FFA enthusiasts had a vision for creating a bigger and brighter Montana FFA where every FFA member could be supported in their pursuit of premier leadership, personal growth, and career success through agricultural education. This group of individuals created the Montana FFA Foundation in 1998 as a support mechanism to enhance opportunities and experiential learning for students in the FFA. Among the founders of the Montana FFA Foundation was Gordon "Lee" Boyer who served as Board President for eight years.

In honor of Lee, the Montana FFA Foundation recognizes individuals for exceptional contributions towards furthering agriculture education in Montana and lifelong commitment of selfless work, focus, and development of the Montana FFA Foundation and the Montana FFA Association by bestowing the Lee Boyer Lifetime Achievement Award. In recognition of the countless hours donated, endless support offered, and professional relationships fostered, we salute a distinguished champion of FFA and agriculture education. This year's Lee Boyer Lifetime Achivement Award recipient is Bill Jimmerson.

Mr. Jimmerson served as an FFA Advisor for 25 years, most of which were in Conrad. During this time, he introduced the Ag Sales CDE, the Ag Issues LDE, the Native American Indian Presentation, and organized the Foundation's first Extravaganza fundraiser. He subsequently served as State FFA Advisor for several years and held various leadership roles in the Montana FFA Foundation and the Montana FFA Alumni & Supporters.
